

What does powering an equitable clean energy future look like, and what is the IPA's role?

- The Illinois Power Agency (IPA) is committed to advancing equity in the clean energy transition, based on mandates outlined by the Climate & Equitable Jobs Act (2021).
 - CEJA strengthened equity and diversity requirements for IPA-administered incentive programs and procurements.
- Implementation of the new CEJA provisions include an **Equity Accountability System** (EAS) featuring a Minimum Equity Standard, Equity Eligible Contractor Category for Illinois Shines and Equity Bid Adjustments for competitive procurements and **Data**Transparency and Accountability measures.



Part I: Equity Accountability System (EAS)

What is the EAS?


The EAS is an umbrella suite of policy levers and standards included in the Illinois Power Agency Act that advance "priority access to the clean energy economy for businesses and workers from communities that have been excluded from economic opportunities in the energy sector, have been subject to disproportionate levels of pollution, and have disproportionately experienced negative public health outcomes" (20 ILCS 3855/1-75(c-10)).



<u>Define Equity Eligible Persons, Equity Eligible Contractors, and Equity Investment Eligible Communities</u>

Equity Eligible Persons (EEP) mean persons who would most benefit from equitable investments by the State designed to combat discrimination, specifically:

- (1) persons who graduate from or are current or former participants in the Clean Jobs Workforce Network, the Clean Energy Contractor Incubator Program, the Illinois Climate Works Preapprenticeship Program, Returning Residents Clean Jobs Training Program, or the Clean Energy Primes Contractor Accelerator Program, and the solar training pipeline and multi-cultural jobs program created by the Future Energy Jobs Act;
- (2) persons who are graduates of or currently enrolled in the foster care system;
- (3) persons who were formerly incarcerated;
- (4) persons whose primary residence is an equity investment eligible community.



<u>Define Equity Eligible Persons, Equity Investment Eligible</u> <u>Communities, and Equity Eligible Contractors</u> (cont.)

Equity Investment Eligible Communities (EIEC) are geographic areas throughout Illinois which would most benefit from equitable investments by the State designed to combat discrimination. The eligible communities are:

- (1) R3 Areas as established pursuant to Section 10-40 of the Cannabis Regulation Tax Act, where residents have historically been excluded from economic opportunities, including opportunities in the energy sector; and
- (2) Environmental justice communities, as defined by the Illinois Power Agency pursuant to the Illinois Power Agency Act, where residents have historically been subject to disproportionate burdens of pollution, including pollution from the energy sector.



Define Equity Eligible Persons, Equity Investment Eligible Communities, and Equity Eligible Contractors (cont.)

Equity Eligible Contractor (EEC) means a business that is majority-owned by Equity Eligible Persons, or a nonprofit or a cooperative that is majority-governed by Equity Eligible Persons or is a natural person that is an Equity Eligible Persons offering personal services as an independent contractor as defined in Section 1-10 of the IPA Act.

Become an Equity Eligible Contractor with Illinois Shines

The Climate and Equitable Jobs Act established an Equity
Accountability System to expand access to the clean energy
economy, including establishing a project category for
Equity Eligible Contractors (EECs) in Illinois Shines. The EEC
category provides:

- A separate, reserved block of project capacity available only to EEC Approved Vendors (AVs)
- Opportunities to receive an advance of capital for REC incentives













Equity Eligible Contractors (cont.)

Who can be EECs?

 Approved Vendors, Designees, and Subcontractors registered to participate in the Illinois Shines solar incentive program who meet EEP criteria

Why become an EEC?

EECs can get capital advance for projects, up to 50% of contract value

EEC Fun Fact: Out of 975 Approved Vendors and Designees registered to participate in Illinois Shines, 77 are EECs.











Equity Eligible Contractors (cont.)

Illinois Shines' EECs "Capacity Block" (aka the EEC Project Category)* is reserved for Distributed Generation and Community Solar Projects submitted by EECs registered to participate in the program.

*Note: The term Capacity Block is not referring to block grants but, rather, the program's available REC contracts by project category.











Other Equity Initiatives

Minimum Equity Standard (MES) is a minimum percentage of project workforce for participating projects that consists of EEPs or EECs. It applies to Illinois Shines and competitive procurements of Indexed RECs from utility-scale wind, solar, and brownfield projects. The MES is required by law to progressively increase each delivery



For Program Year 2023-2024 and 2024-2025:
At least 10% of project workforce for each entity must be comprised of Equity Eligible Persons or Equity Eligible Contractors.


• By 2030:

At least 30% of the project workforce for each entity participating in a procurement program is comprised of EEPs.

Equity Bid Adjustment for Utility-Scale Projects: the IPA develops bid evaluation requirements that favor bids involving Equity Eligible Contractors, ensuring that large-scale projects also contribute to the State's equity goals.



Energy Workforce Equity Portal

The "Equity Portal" is an online source designed to help connect clean energy companies with Equity Eligible Persons looking to work in Illinois' clean energy sector. Making these connections is a key aspect of ensuring that the clean energy industry in Illinois grows in an equitable manner.

Equity Eligible Persons can use the Portal to post their availability for employers. Developers of clean energy projects such as Approved Vendors and Designees in the Illinois Shines Program (also known as the Adjustable Block Program), or **developers of utility-scale wind and solar projects can use the Portal** to post clean energy jobs and to search for Equity Eligible Persons. This Portal is administered by the Illinois Power Agency.

By registering through this portal, Equity Eligible Persons will have the option to be included in a listing of Equity Eligible Persons to be available to clean energy companies that register on this portal. Registrations to be listed as an Equity Eligible Person will be recand verified by the Illinois Power Agency. Registration as an Equity Eligible Person through this portal is voluntary but helps facilitations as an Equity Eligible Person.









Companies Applied, Companies Approved and Total Companies Approved by Month



Are you looking for new opportunities in the cutting-edge renewable energy sector?

If you are, you could qualify for a new initiative in Illinois. Illinois law requires companies participating in the Illinois Shines solar program and select utility-scale renewable project developers to hire a minimum percentage of Equity Eligible Persons (EEPs) to support the state goal of an equitable and inclusive clean energy economy.

You qualify as an EEP if you meet just ONE of these requirements:

- Live in an equity investment eligible community
- Have graduated from, or are a current or former participant of, the Clean Jobs Workforce Network Program; the Clean Energy Contractor Incubator Program; the Illinois Climate Works Preapprenticeship Program; the Returning Residents Clean Jobs Training Program; the Clean Energy Primes Contractor Accelerator Program; Solar training pipeline and multicultural jobs program created by the Future Energy Jobs Act (FEJA)
- Were formerly incarcerated
- . Are formerly or currently a member of the foster care system

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

Simple steps to becoming a certified Equity Eligible Contractor:

Review the Eligibility Criteria

Note that both Approved Vendors and Designees can become certified as an Equity Eligible Contractor.

Complete and submit the <u>AV</u> or <u>Designee</u> registration and <u>attestation</u> form

The Program Administrator may also request additional documentation showing proof of eligibility. It's helpful to have these documents ready to make your application process easier.

Check your email frequently and respond to any Program Administrator follow up requests Application review typically takes two weeks.








Small & Emerging Business Hub (Coming Soon!)

Additional data collection and reporting requirements

1. EAS Assessment – occurring in 2 parts

Objectives:

- Evaluate effectiveness at increasing participation of EEPs/EECs in programs/ procurements
- ID areas for improvement and propose recommendations to ensure EAS meets its goals
- **2. Racial Disparity Study** partner with DCEO, Dept. of Labor to commission, conduct and publish a study to "measure the presence and impact of discrimination on minority businesses and workers in Illinois' clean energy economy" as a whole

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


Deeper Dive: EAS Assessments

Part 1 focus: on available data and insights, covering several key areas: MES Compliance Plans and Mid-Year Reports, EEC Project Category, Competitive Procurement Bid Adjustments, and the Energy Workforce Equity Portal (Part 1 Assessment released August 16, 2024)

Part 2 focus: delve deeper into MES Year-End Reports, MES Waivers, Workforce Demographics, Annual Reporting Data, and will culminate in an overall assessment of the EAS complete with final recommendations for improvements

^{*}This bifurcated approach helps ensure the assessment is as thorough and informed as possible given the timing of data availability.






Deeper Dive: Racial Disparity Study

Objective: to provide complete, comprehensive and legally supportable Racial Disparity and Availability Study to assess the presence and impact of racial discrimination or disparities in Illinois' clean energy economy

Status: Released a Request for Qualifications (RFQ) in Spring 2024 in search for qualified, knowledgeable experts to conduct the study. Responses were due June 21, 2024. Following review of responses, the Agency will issue a Request for Proposals (RFP), inviting responses from firms found qualified through the RFQ process.


• Eligibility Criteria – ILSFA focuses on:

- Income-eligible households: households with an income 80% or less of Area Median Income (AMI) *income verification*
- Non-profit and public facilities located in an <u>environmental justice</u> or income-eligible community and is a "critical service provider" for income-eligible residents
















ILSFA Project Data: Income-Eligible Communities







ILSFA Project Data: Environmental Justice Communities



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Grassroots Educators

Grassroots Educators are:

- Non-profits and trusted members of their communities
- Contracted to conduct Grassroots Education campaigns to educate income-eligible residents about ILSFA

They bridge the divide of accessibility and education by:

- Being trusted sources of information on ILSFA and the Illinois solar market
- Advising on technical process
- Engaging community members in stakeholder feedback processes
- Promoting opportunities for community members to engage with solar training programs



Funding

Grassroots Education Funding

- Up to 5% of program funding can be used for Grassroots Education efforts
- Up to 60% of the budget can focus on environmental justice communities

ILSFA Program Budget allocates 25% of sub-program incentives for:

- Projects located in Environmental Justice communities
- Projects that promote "**Energy Sovereignty**" which:
 - Promotes ownership and local community wealth-building,
 - Brings benefits to participants beyond electricity cost-savings by promoting a path to full ownership, and
 - The right to decision-making over the governance, maintenance, and use of the system/facility.

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





LSFA Project Data: Energy Sovereignty Projects

Project Selection Scoring

During project selection, additional points are awarded to eligible projects:

- Located in income-eligible communities
- Located in environmental justice communities
- Promoting energy sovereignty
- Minority/women-owned business enterprises (MWBE), Approved Vendors, and MWBE sub-contractors

Note: Project selection ensures that when there is more demand for project funds than available, the incentives are going to the programs that best represent the various equity goals that the ILSFA Program is attempting to serve.
